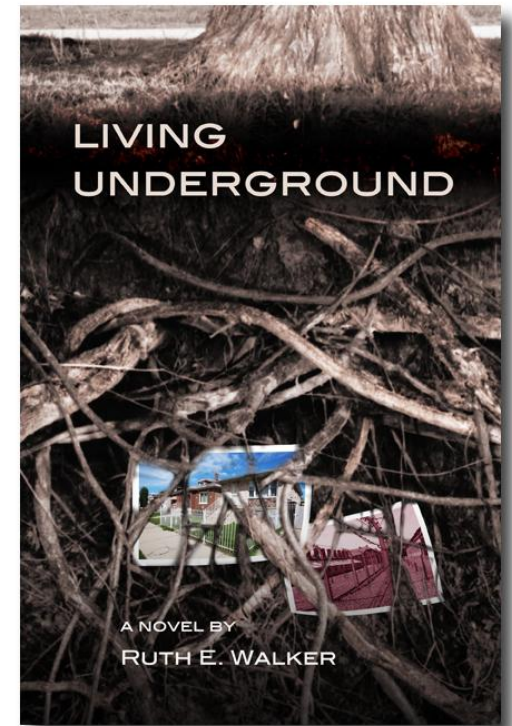

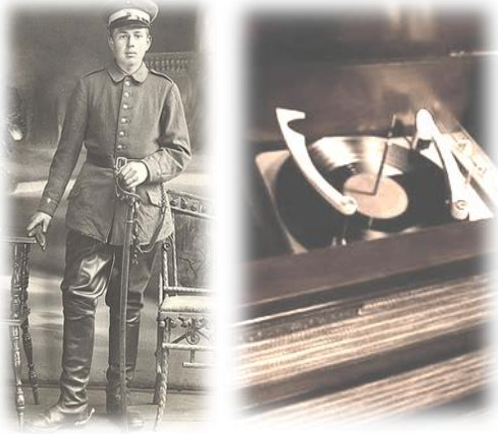

Does 'The Past' Haunt Us and Frame our 'Today'?

1960s Scarborough, Ontario

14-year-old Sheila Barnes dreams of independence and longs to move into the family's basement apartment.

Heading into high school, Sheila believes that the apartment will make up for all the things she knows she doesn't have: confidence, beauty and her mother's love.

Her dreams end when Sigmund Maier moves in. She resents the intrusion of the strange and enigmatic German immigrant until her introduces her to the world of music, art and culture.

Sigmund changes Sheila in ways that she could never imagine then breaks her trust and heart by vanishing.

1914 to 1945 Dresden, Germany

Sigmund Maier longs for his father's family to rescue him and his mother from his miserable grandfather. The time he spends at the Semper Opera House where his mother works as a seamstress allows him to hope.

Young Sigmund is certain that music will be his life until tragedy closes that door. He discovers a new calling working with his hands and, eventually, is caught up in a moral darkness beyond his imagining.

Two childhoods. Two choices. One inevitable outcome.

Sigmund reappears in Sheila's successful adult life. He needs her help in sorting out a "simple misunderstanding" with Canadian immigration officials. But the simple misunderstanding becomes a much darker investigation into his past.

Two points of view take us on a narrative journey through childhood, allowing a glimpse into what shaped these adults who must now make difficult and life-altering choices.

Will Sigmund finally express regret for the pain he caused Sheila? And can Sheila ever forgive him?.
